> Meeting Minutes March 20, 2018

Selectmen present: Allen Belouin, Rebecca Mitchell, Bill Whisman The hearing was called to order at 1900.

Reconstitution of the Board

The TA welcomed the two new Board members, Rebecca Mitchell and Bill Whisman, and explained that it was now necessary to choose a new Chair. Mr. Whisman made the motion to nominate Mr. Belouin as the Board's Chair. Ms. Mitchell seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous and so moved.

MEETING MINUTES:

Meeting Minutes - March 6th.

The new Board reviewed the minutes of March 6th approved by the previous Board.

New Business

Dan Goddu – Resignation

The Board reviewed Mr. Goddu's resignation notice from the planning board effective after the planning board meeting of April 10th. Mr. Belouin made the motion to accept Mr. Goddu's resignation. Mr. Whisman seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous and so moved. The Board acknowledged Mr. Goddu's service.

New Selectmen Training

The new Board members reviewed the training schedule and both Ms. Mitchell and Mr. Whisman chose to attend the April 16th training offered in Peterborough.

Police Department Report

Police Chief Pushee briefed the Board on the activities of the department in the last month highlighting the grant activity for the ballistic vest replacement costs. The grant will cover half of the replacement costs as a reimbursement. Chief Pushee addressed staffing explaining that one of the part-time officers who worked 4 shifts per week is currently working at most two shifts leaving a coverage gap. Chief Pushee proposed a solution where a former police cadet, Tyler Davy, attend the part-time police academy later in the fall. Mr. Pushee noted that he was not seeking permission to extend an offer of employment at this time, but to begin the process. Once the process is further along, he will return to the Board to seek permission to extend a conditional offer of employment. The Board asked the Chief to proceed.

Other Business

The TA briefed the Board on the highway truck issue explaining that Town counsel, Drummond & Wilson, has a potential conflict of interest in representing the Town with the Highway truck warranty issue. Robert Dietl, an experienced litigator with Gallagher, Callahan & Gartrell is a recommended attorney. His firm represents Primex, the Town's insurance carrier, and if the Board agrees then, with the Board's permission, the TA will sign the engagement letter that authorizes Mr. Dietl to represent the Town in this matter. The Board agreed and Mr. Belouin made the motion to approve the representation and to also authorize the TA to sign the engagement letter. Mr. Whisman seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous and so moved.

Non-Public Session – RSA 91-A:3 II(a) & (c)

Ms. Mitchell explained that her schedule made it very difficult to attend the regularly scheduled Wednesday Board meetings and asked if they could be moved to Thursdays. Mr. Whisman made the motion to change the day of the Board meetings from Wednesday to Thursday (every first and third Thursday). Mr. Belouin seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous and so moved.

There being no further business to come before the Board Mr. Belouin made the motion to adjourn. Mr. Whisman seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous and so moved. The meeting adjourned at 2045.

MONTHLY REPORT

NEWS:

- 1. Chief Pushee and Ofc. Bell attended the Senior Luncheon at the Town Hall Meet and Greet with senior citizens.
- 2. Capt. Cavanaugh represented the Department at memorial ceremony for a longtime Deering resident.
- 3. Chief Pushee attended a memorial ceremony for NH State Trooper Drew Keith, whom he knew with prior to his LE career, and who was Cadre at Chief Pushee's session of the Police Academy.
- 4. Chief Pushee and Ofc. Bell will be presenting a Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events class for staff at His Mansion in March.
- Chief Pushee, Civilian Cadet Advisor Hargreaves, and Senior Cadet Captain Tyler Davy will be presenting an Introduction to NH Police Exploring at the Concord Regional Technical Center for three classroom sessions near the end of March.

TRAINING:

- 1. Members of the Police Department and the Cadet Post participated in Police Expandable Baton Annual Refresher Training.
- 2. In March, members of the Department will be training in Adult Sexual Assault Investigation Protocols at Hillsboro PD.
- In March, members of the Department will be attending TASER Annual Refresher Training at Hillsboro PD.

GRANTS:

- 2019 Highway Safety Patrol Grants we have about 4-6 hours of DUI Patrol left, which by grant rules must be held until the DUI Enforcement Month in August.
- 2. Bulletproof Vest Partnership Chief Pushee is in the process of requesting reimbursement for up to 50% of the cost of the ballistic vests recently received to replace outdated vests for Capt. Cavanaugh and Ofc. Forsley. He is waiting for Bank Information to be received and approved by BVP. There was some delay in this process due to the Govt Shutdown.

JUVENILE ACTIVITY:

1. No new JV Activity, although we have Petitions and Court Dates scheduled for a BB Gun Assault issue that occurred in October, and we are waiting until after another suspects 18th birthday to file JV charges in a burglary/theft/vandalism case (if they are almost at their birthday, you "lose" jurisdiction on their birthday, so by waiting, the court will retain jurisdiction for a year after filing.)









February Highway Department Report

The sun is getting hotter and the storms are usually bigger in February. We enjoy the warm sun but we still only had one real "snow" storm with eight inches and two with about four inches. I hope this doesn't mean we will get some big storms in March and April. We have been busy replacing cutting edges on the front plow of T2, the wing of the grader, front plow of T3 and T5. I have ordered a power steering pump for T2 to repair the steering issue. I hit the stop sign on the corner of Clement Hill and Dickey Hill. We have put it in a bucket and will replace the post in spring.

We had eight events we took care of for the month. Three plowable storms, four snow to rain events we plowed that were three or less inches and one just rain event.

We put salt out at a rate eight hundred pounds per mile on a two-lane road. There are twenty-two miles of paved road with twenty-six paved intersections and aprons.

17,600 lbs of salt to treat 22 miles of road.

1,700 lbs of salt to treat 26 paved intersections and aprons.

This totals 19,300 lbs of salt to treat all our pavement once.

February's salt use totals:

1 Snow event with one salting after the storm	19,300 lbs of salt
2 Snow event-One pre salt, one salt after storm	77,200 lbs of salt
2 Snow to rain event -One pre salt and one salt after	77,200 lbs of salt
2 Snow to rain event -One salting after storm	38,600 lbs of salt
1 Rain event-Two salting's after	38,600 lbs of salt

Total salt use in February is: 250,900 lbs=125,450 tons @56.25 per ton

Total cost for salt in February is \$7,056.56

We have forty-one miles of gravel roads and seven gravel parking lots. Its very hard to calculate how much sand we use because hills and corners get more as do problem spots. Basically we put out 186 yards of sand per one sanding. During the rain events we will put out more as it gets washed away some.

February's sand usage totals:

2 Snow event- One Sanding	372 yards of sand
1 Snow event- Two sanding's	372 yards of sand
2 Snow to rain events- Two sanding's each event	744 yards of sand
2 Snow to rain events- One sanding each	372 yards of sand
1 Rain event-Two sanding's each event	372 yards of sand
February's sand use is 2,232 yards	

We have the breakdown on T4's engine (new ten wheeler) back in November with it still out of service. We have T1(2010 kw ten wheeler), T2(2005 IH 7600 ten wheeler), T3 (1999 Paystar) all running with sanders, plows and wings, T5(Chevy 5500) with a front plow only and E11 (Grader) with front plow and wing to plow our main routes. E13(Backhoe) and T6 (Ford F350) have plowed the parking lots and helped with intersections. E12 (Komatsu Loader) loads the salt and sand at the shop then we move it to the pit loading sand for us.

NEWS:

In February, Deering Fire & Rescue (DFR) responded to seventeen (17) emergency calls. Thirteen (13) medical calls and four (4) fire calls, including two more chimney fires, giving us six chimney fires in the first two months. That number is up significantly higher than in previous years. This winter, there have been many chimney fires that have turned into building fires around the state, burning dry hard wood, regular inspections and cleanings will keep you safe from these types of fires.

We are working to develop programs to help the community. Soon, we will be posting these programs on our Facebook page. Programs such as Home Safety Checks, helping our residents change the batteries in their homes, File of Life program and other events to engage the community in fire safety.

- 1) Prepare to meet with the residents to discuss our warrant article regarding the replacement of Engine 3.
- 2) Planning the bid process if the article is approved.
- 3) Have all apparatus serviced.
